Hans Joachim Hoffmann. Jerry Hans Hoffman PhD, 80, Omaha Nebraska, passed away Wednesday, October 31st, 2018. Jerry was born January 22, 1938 to parents Heinrich and Editha Hoffmann in Germany. He immigrated to the US in 1953 and became a citizen in 1959. A dedicated scholar, he proudly graduated from Wittenberg University and The University of Pittsburgh. He spent his full professional career as a history professor at Creighton University and enjoyed his retirement in the Teton Valley in Idaho. A celebration of life will be held from 2:00-5:00pm, November 24th at Lower St. John's on the Creighton University Campus, 2500 California Plaza, Omaha, NE 68178. He is preceded in death by both parents and brother-in-law, Peter Jahn. Survivors include sister, Christiana Jahn and nephews Christoph and Matthias; daughter, Tanya Hoffman Stevens (Scott) and her mother Elizabeth Hoffman, cousin, Peter Cothmann (Petra) and partner, Jeanne Christensen. Dr. Hoffman loved to bicycle. That was where I really got to know him best. My boyfriend at the time and I would meet him nearly every weekend for a bike ride. Even though he was over 30 years our senior he was ALWAYS at the front of the group. Going 100 miles a day was common. Sometimes we got lost. It was all part of the adventure. I remember one particular trip after stopping at a McDonalds he realized his wallet had been on the tray when he dumped it in the trash. That was over 20 miles back. We made it back to the cars just before dark. I think we did about 130 miles that day. After that, Jerry never took his wallet with him, so you always planned to comp his lunch or dinner. It was a standing joke. We biked many miles, often in silence but sometimes in conversation. I did not realize all those years ago how much those conversations and bike rides would mean to me.

I lost touch with him until just this last summer. I received an unexpected phone call from him. I was never so shocked! We had a wonderful visit and shared some memories and laughs. There are certain things that will always remind me of him: Wrangler Brand Hot Dogs, German Shepherds (not the fake American kind), Bianchi Bicycles (with the fat foam handle bar covers), the Walking Cane Lounge and the movie "A Fish Called Wanda."

I know you are now skiing down that perfect powdery slope and

enjoying an endless tailwind biking down the perfect road. Thank you for the many fond memories and may you rest in peace. You will always have my respect and admiration.
